None of our accomplishments would be possible without our devoted staff, the support of Kentucky's fire departments, and the support of KCTCS. 



STATE FIRE SCHOOL

The 94th edition of the Kentucky State Fire School was held June 11-15 in Lexington. 623 students from 218 departments/ agencies participated in 35 classes.

INCENTIVE & PENSION

The Incentive & Pension fund continues to supplement eligible local governments, plus an amount equal to the required employers contribution on the supplement to the defined benefit pension plan, or to a plan qualified under Section 401(1) or Section 457 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 as amended.

To be eligible for incentive pay, firefighters must have a minimum of 300 training hours, work at least 2,080 hours and earn at least \$8,000 annually. To maintain eligibility, all firefighters in the department must complete one hundred (100) hours of training annually. Eligible firefighters each received \$4,429 during FY2025 through this program.

Incentive and pension funds totaling \$18,711,699.24 were distributed to 4,183 firefighters during FY2025.

HEPATITIS VACCINATIONS

During FY2025, the Fire Commission's voluntary Hepatitis vaccination program assisted in providing funds for 37 Hepatitis immunizations. The Fire Commission collaborates with local health departments in this program and sponsors Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B or a combination of both Hepatitis A/B vaccines for Kentucky's firefighters.

THERMAL IMAGING CAMERA GRANTS

It is the goal of the Kentucky Fire Commission to ensure every fire department throughout the Commonwealth has at least one thermal imaging camera. 148 departments were awarded thermal imaging cameras in FY2025.

TRAINING FACILITY GRANTS

The Fire Commission's Training Facility Grants program allows eligible and approved fire departments access to much needed funds to enhance their department's training program with facilities and equipment. During FY2025, 48 departments were awarded a total of \$1,000,000 in grant funds.

FIRE DEPARTMENT COMPLIANCE INSPECTIONS

The Fire Commission conducts compliance inspections of training and financial documentation, State-Aid and Incentive Pay disbursements, grant equipment and purchases, and department apparatus and equipment.

Our team of four Training Records & Compliance Specialists conducted 509 inspections during FY2025 and will continue to conduct annual inspections throughout the Commonwealth.

LOW INTEREST LOANS

The Low Interest Loan program is available for any volunteer fire department that meets certain criteria. Volunteer fire departments can borrow up to \$125,000. Funds in the amount of \$1,652,196.00 were distributed to 20 departments in FY2025.

STATE AID

The Fire Commission's State Aid program is available to all qualifying volunteer fire departments in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. During FY2025, the Kentucky Fire Commission allotted up to \$15,000 to each qualifying volunteer fire department throughout the Commonwealth.

In FY2025, 649 departments were awarded State Aid for a total of \$9,954,000. Monies must be allocated toward specific expenditures approved by the Fire Commission.

Funds are required to be spent in total each fiscal year. Departments may hold the entirety of the funds over into the following fiscal year to acquire enough funds for a more substantial project. Partial carryover is disallowed.

Funds may also be applied toward Fire Commission loan payments.

JUNIOR FIREFIGHTERS

The Junior Firefighter program allows youth ages 15-17 the opportunity to learn about fire and emergency services organizations in a safe, supervised, controlled and fun manner. There are 455 departmental junior programs registered in Kentucky.

The Fire Commission held a training class specific to junior firefighters during State Fire School in June in Lexington. 26 junior firefighters from 15 fire departments participated in this class.







HEALTH AND WELLNESS



The Fire Commission's Health & Wellness Program funds the purchase of fitness equipment and gear extractors for qualifying fire departments of the Commonwealth. Through this grant in FY2025, 10 fire departments received fitness equipment and 20 fire departments received gear extractors.







FIREFIGHTER CANCER SCREENING REIMBURSEMENT

Cancer is a rising and dangerous threat to firefighter health and safety. Firefighters face a higher risk of being diagnosed with, and dying of, cancer than the general U.S. population. Early detection is paramount to manage this risk.

In FY2025, the Fire Commission piloted a program to reimburse eligible firefighters for the cost of cancer screenings performed at designated testing sites. This pilot program was met with great interest and it is anticipated to be revisited during the 2026 legislative session in hopes of passing funding for this screening into law.





STRESS INJURY TREATMENT REIMBURSEMENT

Firefighters have long been about helping others; these days more than ever, that includes fellow firefighters. The Kentucky Fire Commission is proud to offer a policy for line-of-duty stress injury treatment reimbursement. This program establishes funds for reimbursement of out-of-pocket expenses that a firefighter has incurred after being diagnosed with a line-of-duty stress injury through firefighting related experiences. Each qualifying individual may receive reimbursement benefits up to \$50,000 for care or treatment that was provided on or after July 1, 2020.

During FY2025, 88 firefighters received reimbursements totaling \$196,027.58.

No one should suffer with PTSD on their own.

If you are a firefighter struggling with this, or you know one who is, please seek help from a licensed mental health professional.

PEER SUPPORT TRAINING

The Kentucky Fire Commission partnered with the International Association of Firefighters to present two Peer Support Training Classes during FY2025. 54 participants received training and skills practice to become effective peer counselors and learn how to establish peer support teams for their fire departments. This program is designed specifically for firefighters, EMS providers, dispatchers, chaplains, firefighter retirees, behavioral health specialists and any member of the fire service interested in supporting their fellow firefighters during tough times.






Since 2013, administrative regulations in the state of Kentucky mandate all newly hired career firefighters pass the Candidate Physical Ability Test (CPAT). CPAT is set up to develop a fair and valid evaluation tool in the selection of firefighters to ensure that all firefighter candidates possess the physical ability to complete critical tasks effectively and safely. CPAT is a sequence of events requiring the participant to progress along a predetermined path from event to event in a continuous manner. Stations include: Stair Climb, Hose Drag, Equipment Carry, Ladder Raise and Extension, Forcible Entry, Search, Rescue and Ceiling Breach and Pull.

The Fire Commission has three fixed testing locations: Burlington, Louisville and Paris, and administers testing monthly.

APPRENTICE I & II CERTIFICATION

The Kentucky Fire Commission has established two firefighter certification levels for students enrolled into Kentucky Department of Education (KDE)-sponsored Fire Science programs. Students engage in hands-on and lecture training in an environment that will allow them to work toward certification as a Kentucky Apprentice I Firefighter (100 hours of training) and as a Kentucky Apprentice II Firefighter (200 hours of training). These programs enable students to acquire knowledge and aptitude of fire service administration and firefighting tasks while still in high school, allowing them to accrue necessary skills toward service as a career or volunteer firefighter once they turn 18.

Students with Fire Science Program of Studies course codes successfully transcripted will be eligible to request approval for credit for prior learning credits upon enrolling into a KCTCS campus offering the Fire Science Degree Program.

Apprentice I and Apprentice II certifications are only available to students enrolled in a KDE-sponsored Fire Science pathway.

During school year 2024-2025, the initial year of this program offering, Fire Science Pathway programs were offered at 9 Kentucky high schools, with active student enrollment of 459. Apprentice I certifications were awarded to 44 students, and Apprentice II certifications were awarded to 3 students.

LEGISLATIVE



The 2025 Kentucky Legislative Session saw numerous bills related to Kentucky's fire service introduced. Representatives of Kentucky's fire service and the Kentucky Fire Commission continued their efforts to educate legislators, protect the interests of the Kentucky's fire service and campaign on behalf of moving the fire service of the Commonwealth forward. Several bills related to the fire service were passed through Committee and were ultimately passed into law:

STATE OF STATE FIRE RESCUE TRAINING









FY2025 saw another remarkable year for State Fire Rescue Training, with significant strides in program development, training delivery, and statewide impact. The organization introduced new stateof-the-art props and training aids, launched innovative programs, and began forging new partnershipsall with the goal of enhancing the training experience for firefighters across Kentucky. Over 100,000 students participated in SFRT programs this year, a testament to the dedication of instructors and the strong support from fire departments throughout the Commonwealth.

The Fire Academy of Kentucky continued to evolve, with progress underway on its property in Muhlenberg County. Plans for a new dormitory building are in their final stages, with construction expected to begin mid-FY2026. The Academy has successfully completed six recruit classes, thanks to the trust and feedback from participating departments, which have been instrumental in shaping the Academy into a premier training center.

FY2025 also saw the full rollout of the virtual Fire Commission class series, offering essential training in Firefighter Survival, Firefighter Rescue, Flashover Recognition, and Wildland Awareness. With two sessions offered each month—both daytime and evening options—the series has proven to be a popular and accessible way for firefighters to meet vital training requirements.

To support certification planning, during FY2025 SFRT organized a comprehensive schedule of Classes for Certification through June 2026 in IFSAC Driver/Operator, IFSAC Fire Instructor, and IFSAC Fire Officer categories. Details are available on the Fire Commission's newly updated website.

As SFRT looks ahead, the focus remains on growth, innovation, and excellence. The organization is committed to delivering world-class training programs and continuing to support the dedicated individuals who serve Kentucky's communities. We look forward to serving you in FY2026 and beyond.



% KY Fire Departments Trained By SFRT







EMS EDUCATION



State Fire Rescue Training is a leading provider of emergency services training for all sectors of the emergency response spectrum, including fire departments, EMS services, rescue squads, emergency management, public health, transportation, and community response agencies. SFRT offers training in Emergency Medical Responder, Emergency Medical Technician-Basic, Advanced Emergency Medical Technician, Paramedic, and a full menu of continuing education classes for all levels.

During FY2025 SFRT offered 25 Initial Certification classes with enrollment of 273 students, and led 131 Continuing Education classes, serving 2,010 students.

The Fire Commission offered a Hybrid EMT-Basic and EMT-Advanced class series in FY2025. 79 students participated in the EMT-Basic class, and 99 students participated in the EMT-Advanced class.

VIRTUAL TRAINING

First implemented during the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic during FY2020, the Fire Commission and State Fire Rescue Training continued to offer training on a Virtual Instructor-Led Training (VILT) Platform in FY2025.

VILT classes are led by an instructor in real-time, thereby allowing firefighters to utilize this type of training to assist toward completion of their Basic 1 and Basic 2 Kentucky certifications while still adhering to administrative regulations that require face-to-face training for initial certification hours. Certified firefighters are also able to use VILT for their annual continuing education requirements.

During FY2025, VILT served 11,825 students via 253 classes.

The Associate of Applied Science in Fire Science Technology Program prepares for the challenges facing today's emergency responders. The Fire Commission's degree program is IFSAC Accredited and recognized by the National Fire Academy's Fire and Emergency Services Higher Education (FESHE) program.

The program offers courses in:

- Fire Suppression
- Fire Prevention
- Technical Rescue
- **Hazardous Materials**
- Emergency Medical Care
 Leadership

Students may enter the program with or without experience in emergency services. The degree, certificate and diploma programs that are offered can help in obtaining employment in various emergency service fields, or if already a firefighter, help assist in promotional opportunities. The program may be continued as a 2+2 program with Western Kentucky University's Work Force Administration Program. Students may also work with other higher education institutions, such as Eastern Kentucky University, to transfer certain coursework in pursuit of a 4-year collegiate degree.

Academic certificates are also available for Emergency Medical Responder, Emergency Medical Technician, Basic Fire Protection, Basic Firefighter, Advanced Firefighter, Hazardous Materials Technician, and Fire Service Administration. A Fire Chief diploma is offered as well.

Director of Training Marc Rudder serves on the IFSAC Degree Program Board of Governors and Casey Hall, Academic Coordinator of Curriculum & Fire Service Training, serves on the IFSAC Council of Governors.

196 students were enrolled into the Fire Commission's degree program (excluding Emergency Medical Technician courses) during the 2024-2025 school year. Approximately 447 Certificates, Diplomas, and Degrees were awarded to students completing in 2024-2025.

FIRE ACADEMY OF KENTUCKY

The Fire Academy of Kentucky is being developed as the primary facility for Kentucky fire departments to send their new recruits for initial Basic 2 certification as required for full-time career firefighters, and optional for volunteer firefighters.

FY2025 saw Class 005 and Class 006 graduate from the Academy. Recruits from across the Commonwealth assemble in Greenville at the 50-acre campus to undergo 13 weeks of physical, classroom and skills training and exit their time at the Academy fully prepared to protect their citizens. The Academy accepts fire department-sponsored career and volunteer firefighters to its program free of charge. A 4-week accelerated Emergency Medical Technician class is offered to previous Academy graduates, and those registered for the upcoming Academy recruit class.

The Academy is aligned with Madisonville Community and Technical College as a Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges facility. Each recruit receives up to 30 college credits, placing them approximately halfway to a KCTCS Associate of Applied Science-Fire Science Technology degree.

The Academy continued its expansion project during FY2025, with completion of a new 5-story training/burn tower. On-property dormitory-style housing for the recruits is currently in the final planning stages, and construction is anticipated to begin during FY2026. Construction will also begin on a new warehouse facility during this time.

ACCREDITED CERTIFICATION



Kentucky recognizes the International Fire Service Accreditation Congress (IFSAC) as its certification board. In addition to its certificate program, IFSAC also provides governing for the Fire Commission/State Fire Rescue Training's Fire Science Technology degree program. Accredited Certification Coordinator Christy Rodgers serves on the IFSAC Certificate Assembly Board of Governors and is the Vice Chair of the IFSAC Committee on Site Teams.

IFSAC accreditation is based on a peer-review process. During FY2025, Fire Commission employees participated in 11 site visits to review each entity's IFSAC program.

Written tests are administered via an online platform monthly in each district office as well as by appointment at the Accredited Certification office. 3,468 seals were issued in FY2025 from 5,450 candidates attempting written testing. 159 skills testing sessions were offered across the state during FY2025 with 3,214 candidates.
