



Class # 1 - EMT Continuing Education

This comprehensive three-day course fulfills all training requirements established by the Kentucky Board of Emergency Medical Services (KBEMS) and the National Registry of EMTs (NREMT) for the 24-hour EMT Refresher Course/National Continued Competency Program (NCCP). The course includes a combination of engaging lectures, hands-on practical sessions, and competency testing to ensure participants meet both state and national standards for recertification.

Class # 2 – Rapid Intervention Team (R.I.T.)

Whether your department has a designated crew for Firefighter Rescue or not, this class will cover the topics that all firefighters need to know in the event of a firefighter emergency. This class will give the firefighter the knowledge and skills to effectively work through a mayday and execute a rescue when needed. Topics of instruction will include but are not limited to firefighter search & assessment, supplemental air, maydays, horizontal drags, window removals and floor removals. Due to the fast pace of instruction and skills, all students must already be a certified firefighter in KY. Students must bring full PPE with SCBA and a spare cylinder. THIS IS A PHYSICALLY DEMANDING CLASS!!

Class # 3 – Hard to Get Hours

This is a two-day class covering those hard-to-get hours you need to obtain your certification. *All students need to bring full PPE*. Classes taught will be:

Class # 4 - Engine Company Ops w/LIVE FIRE

As a member of an engine company, there are specific skills we must master. This hands-on course will go indepth on three of those skills, stretching hose lines, knowing your proper flows, and efficient water application. When it comes to stretching hand lines, we only get one chance to get it right. This portion will cover hose line deployment, extending lines, and difficult stretches such as obstacles and overcoming common stretching issues. Students will have multiple repetitions on each of these. Knowing your flow will be the second skill station. We must know how to match our hose to the proper nozzle. Students will flow different sizes and types of nozzles for handlines. Efficient application of water inside a fire is more important now than it has ever been. This portion of the course will cover water mapping, interior stream angles, and coordinated fire attack. This program is for all experience levels in the fire service.

**PRE-REQUISITES/EQUIPMENT NEEDED:

Prior completion of subjects listed on the Live Fire Course Competency Validation form. This form must be presented to the instructor the first day of class. Full PPE & SCBA with a spare cylinder is required. All PPE must be less than 10 years old and SCBA cylinders within hydrostatic test date. Any student with facial hair that impedes the seal of the face piece will not be allowed to participate.

Class # 5 – Advanced Auto Extrication

This class is for the experienced firefighter that has a strong working knowledge of auto extrication. Students will be presented with real-life, complicated extrication and stabilization scenarios while working in groups with various types of tools to best accomplish the goal. This class is meant to challenge and sharpen skills, this is NOT a basic extrication class. Students can expect to take away new knowledge from this class while sharpening existing skills.

Class # 6 – National Fire Academy Training Operations in Small Departments (00290)

This 2-day course is designed to provide students with some basic tools and skills to coordinate training in a small fire/emergency medical services organization. A training function in a smaller department typically may include conducting training drills and coordinating training with a nearby larger city or state training function.

Course content includes:

- Leadership issues in fire service training, such as why and how the local training officer must be a catalyst for change and personal motivators within the department.
- Identifying the legal issues affecting the training function, including an understanding of a standard of care and the impact of Occupational Safety and Health Administration and NFPA standards.
- Safety considerations in training.
- Marketing training internally.
- Identifying ways to justify training needs.
- Resolving training conflicts using appropriate conflict resolution techniques.

Class # 7 – Instructor Methodology Update

This class is designed for company officers and other fire or rescue service personnel with the responsibility of conducting periodic company level or small unit training, introducing the participant to basic instructional concepts and techniques. Emphasis is on teaching principles and techniques applicable to fire and rescue service training and includes effective communication, teaching from lesson plans, methods of instruction, with emphasis on skills training, and adult learning. This session will focus on current technologies available to enhance your presentation. This course meets one of the requirements for newly announced Fire Service Instructor recertification as published in 739 Kentucky Administrative Regulation (KAR) 2:060. For additional information regarding recertification, please contact your local SFRT district office.

Class # 8 – Electric Vehicle Fires

The Electric Vehicle class will focus on preparing first responders for the unique challenges of responding to fires involving electric and hybrid vehicles. This class covers topics like identifying EV and hybrid vehicles, understanding the specific hazards associated with electric batteries, and learning effective fire suppression and containment techniques, including the use of specialized tools and equipment.

Class # 9 – National Traffic Incident Management (TIM)

The "TIM class" refers to the National Traffic Incident Management (TIM) Responder Training, a program designed to equip first responders with the knowledge and skills to safely and efficiently clear traffic incidents, promoting coordinated responses, and minimizing disruptions.

The training focuses on ensuring the safe and efficient movement of people and goods on highways by emphasizing coordinated response strategies to protect motorists and responders, while minimizing traffic disruptions.

Live Fire Course Competency Validation/Fitness for Duty Form Required for all students before participating in SFRT Live Fire Training

NFPA 1403 (2018 Edition) 4.3.1 - 4.3.3 require that all participants must have prior training and meet prerequisites in certain subjects before participating in live fire training. These minimum subjects include:

1) Safety; 2) Fire Behavior; 3) Portable Extinguishers; 4) Personal Protective Equipment & SCBA; 5) Ladders; 6) Fire Hose, Appliances, and Streams; 7) Overhaul; 8) Water Supply; 9) Ventilation; 10) Forcible Entry; 11) Building Construction. Specific prerequisite training must also be met in these areas: Fire Dynamics; Health and Safety; Fundamentals of Fire Behavior; Fire Development in Compartments; Nozzle Techniques and Door Control.

The Chief Officer of	Fire Department
authorizes that	completed the minimum

training/prerequisites and may participate in the live fire training evolutions present by SFRT.

NFPA 1403 (2018 Edition) 4.4.1 requires that all participants must be rehabbed in accordance with NFPA 1584, Chapter 6. Before being released from the rehab area to participate in a State Fire Rescue Training live fire training evolution, normal conditions are considered to consist of: heart rate of 60-100; respiratory rate of 12-20; systolic blood pressure less than 160; diastolic blood pressure of less than 100; pulse oximetry of 95% or greater. Participants are encouraged to periodically check their vital signs and seek appropriate medical attention for abnormal signs/symptoms.

Participants must be a member of a Fire Department, Industrial Fire Brigade or Junior Firefighter program (Ages 15-17) that is recognized by the Kentucky Fire Commission to participate in live fire training delivered by State Fire Rescue Training. ID's will be checked by SFRT instructors before allowing students to participate in live fire training and some evolutions/activities are restricted for 15-17 year old Junior Firefighters (See current Junior Firefighter Guidelines on KY Fire Commission website.) All turnout gear must be less than 10 years of age. Per NFPA 1403 (2018 Edition) A4.9.5 it is recommended that all participants wear full-length clothing made of natural fibers or fire-retardant materials under their personal protective equipment during live fire evolutions.

Facepiece seal protection: SFRT requires that all students must be compliant with OSHA 29 CFR 1910.134: "<u>1910.134(g)(1)(i)</u>-The employer shall not permit respirators with tight-fitting facepieces to be worn by employees who have: <u>1910.134(g)(1)(i)(A)</u> - Facial hair that comes between the sealing surface of the facepiece and the face or that interferes with valve function;" (hair growth between the skin and the facepiece sealing surface, such as stubble beard growth, beard, mustache or sideburns which cross the respirator sealing surface).
