Cancer Screening

As a result of our continued commitment to the health and wellness of our members, Southeastern Kentucky Firefighters Association/Kentucky Fire Commission will be partnering with United Diagnostic Services to host a health screening event on October 3rd - 4th, 2026 at our SKFA Fire School.

For firefighters this screening is reimbursed \$325 by the Kentucky Fire Commission leaving the participant paying \$10 out of pocket. Representatives from the Kentucky Fire Commission will also be on site to help facilitate the reimbursement process.

UDS will be conducting early detection diagnostic testing, which has proven successful in identifying actionable pathologies to improve overall health as well as early detection for cancer and cardiovascular issues. Early detection has had a significant impact on helping prevent and reverse potential future catastrophic events.

All tests are ultrasound based and therefore painless and non-invasive. Tests include an Echocardiogram, Carotid, Abdominal Aorta, Thyroid, Liver, Spleen, Gallbladder, Bladder, Kidney, and Testicular scan. This screening also includes an Exterior Pelvic scan for females. The examination will take approximately 30 min to complete.

Fasting for at least 8 hours is required for the screening and you must pre-register to participate. Individuals are allowed to drink water during this period. About 1 ½ hours prior to appointment time, start to drink 32 ounces of water so bladder is full at the start of the exam. Be sure to use the email & phone number you'd like to receive updates when registering.

One Day Classes

010 EMT Con-Ed I & II

Friday 1pm – 10pm

Course Codes: Various

This course will fulfill 8 out of 24 hours meeting the training requirements established by the Kentucky Board of Emergency Medical Services (KBEMS) and the National Registry of EMTs (NREMT) for the 24-hour EMT Refresher Course/National Continued Competency Program (NCCP). The course includes a combination of engaging lectures, hands-on practical sessions, and competency testing to ensure participants meet both state and national standards for recertification.

020 Bobtail LPG

Friday 6pm – 10pm

Course Code: M0004

Residential LPG Emergencies: 500-Gallon Propane Live Fire Training

This hands-on course provides firefighters with practical experience responding to residential liquefied petroleum gas (LPG) emergencies involving a typical **500-gallon propane tank**.

Students will review the properties and hazards of propane, residential tank installations, LPG emergency recognition, establishing appropriate incident priorities, apparatus and personnel positioning, water-supply considerations, exposure protection, and coordination with propane providers and other responding agencies.

The practical portion will utilize a **500-gallon LPG live-fire training prop** to allow students to observe propane fire behavior and practice coordinated fire-attack and control techniques in a supervised training environment.

Emphasis will be placed on **risk assessment, crew coordination, proper PPE and SCBA use, effective hose-stream application, maintaining safe operating positions, and recognizing conditions that may require defensive operations or withdrawal.**

This course combines classroom instruction with realistic live-fire evolutions to better prepare firefighters for LPG emergencies they may encounter at residences throughout their communities.

PRE-REQUISITES/EQUIPMENT NEEDED Students should be prepared for training in full turnout gear and SCBA while on air.

All PPE must be less than 10 years old and SCBA cylinders within hydrostatic test date. Any student with facial hair that impedes the seal of the face piece will not be allowed to participate per NFPA 1500 and NFPA 1403.***

030 Basic Firefighting I**Friday 6pm – 10pm**

Course Codes: D0000 – Fire Behavior
F0000 – Personal Protective Equipment

This course will cover four of the recommended twenty hours of training for new firefighters and enhance the knowledge of the veteran firefighter. It will consist of one hour of Personal Protective Equipment and three hours of Fire Behavior.

Equipment needed: Full turnout gear, including SCBA.

040 Swift Water Awareness**Friday 6pm – 10pm**

Course Code: Q0005

This class teaches all the knowledge and skills required to perform at the awareness level which is designed for responders to acquire the skills necessary to recognize and support a swift water incident. It also provides an overview of specific rescue situations and precautions that responders should utilize on scene of a swift water incident.

050 Hard to Get I**Friday 6pm – 10pm**

Course Codes: W0000 - Aircraft
Y0000 – Cause & Origin
C0000 - Communications

This course is designed to assist the firefighter that is almost certified but lacks just a few hours that are “hard-to-get”.

060 Vehicle Extrication**Friday 6pm – 10pm**

Course Code: Q0001

This course is designed to educate the rescuer on the proper techniques of vehicle extrication. Topics covered will include safety, scene size-up & preparation, stabilization, new car designs & features, as well as various types of patient extrication techniques. This will be a strictly hands-on course where students will learn and practice the most up-to-date techniques for patient disentanglement, dashboard displacement, incident management & scene safety.

Equipment Needed: Helmet, eye protection, extrication jumpsuit/turnout gear, gloves & boots.

070 Firefighter Cancer Awareness**Friday 6pm – 10pm**

Course Code: B0001

This course is designed for all levels of fire service personnel from Recruits to Chief Fire Officers. It will provide the students with better knowledge and understanding of the dangers Occupational Cancer poses to all members of the fire service and their families. Students will understand the links between firefighting and cancer, current actions that increase the risk of contracting cancer, limitations of PPE against exposure to carcinogens, and preventative measures to decrease the risk of contracting cancer.

080 Manufactured Housing Fires**Friday 6pm – 10pm**

Course Code: M0001

This course was designed to educate Kentucky's Fire Service on the topic of Manufactured Housing Fires. Kentucky has about 230,000 manufactured homes spread across all 120 counties. These structures are unique from other structures in many ways and can present some different challenges for firefighters. This course primarily focuses on single-wide manufactured housing or what many people term a "mobile home" or "trailer" in common language.

100 EMT Con-Ed III**Saturday 8:30am – 5pm**

Course Codes: Various

This course will fulfill 8 out of 24 hours meeting the training requirements established by the Kentucky Board of Emergency Medical Services (KBEMS) and the National Registry of EMTs (NREMT) for the 24-hour EMT Refresher Course/National Continued Competency Program (NCCP). The course includes a combination of engaging lectures, hands-on practical sessions, and competency testing to ensure participants meet both state and national standards for recertification.

105 Basic Firefighting II**Saturday 8:30am – 5pm**

Course Codes: F0000 – Personal Protective Equipment
G0000 – Forcible Entry
J0000 – Ladders

This course will cover eight of the recommended twenty hours of training for new firefighters and enhance the knowledge of the veteran firefighter. It will consist of 2 hours of Personal Protective Equipment, 3 hours of Forcible Entry and 3 hours of Ladders.

Equipment needed: Full turnout gear, including SCBA.

110 Fire Alarms & Sprinklers**Saturday 8:30am – 5pm**

Course Code: S0000

This class is developed and presented for the industry professionals that are required to attend and receive recertification credit for licensure. It will help students have a deeper understanding of fire alarm systems. Class will have discussions as to where alarms are required, installed and maintained. Also, proper inspection of the systems, how they function, how they help save lives, and how they may benefit the fire service. This class qualifies for the six (6) hours continuing education required for State Certified Fire Alarm Inspectors.

115 Inspector II (KY Fire Marshall)**Saturday 8:30am – 5pm**

Course Code: DD0002

This class is designed for the fire inspectors and building code officials that deal with life safety issues on a daily basis. The student will get detailed instruction on occupancy requirements and occupant loads. This class will consist of instruction followed by an exam. Students are encouraged to bring a tablet computer or laptop and calculator.

Lead Instructor: State Fire Marshall's Office**120 LIVE BURN – Acquired Structure****Saturday 8:30am – 5pm**

Course Code: M0001

In this course Students will practice suppression techniques for residential structure fires. This will be a LIVE FIRE Training Session in an Acquired Structure. Topics covered will be Fire Control, Fire Behavior, as well as Hose Advancement, Communications & Accountability. This course will offer great training to the new firefighter that needs experience inside an IDLH atmosphere, or for the firefighter seeking to polish their skills and learn new techniques for operating at a residential structure fire.

PRE-REQUISITES/EQUIPMENT NEEDED Students should be prepared for training in full turnout gear and SCBA while on air.

125 PTSD Chip Terry/Cody Spaulding**Saturday 8:30am – 5pm**

Course Code: B0004

AM Session — Joe Terry | The Chip Terry Fund

The morning portion of this course will feature **Joe Terry of The Chip Terry Fund**, sharing the powerful and personal story behind the organization and its mission to address PTSD, mental health, and suicide awareness within the fire service.

Joe will discuss the impact that traumatic calls, cumulative stress, and the culture of emergency services can have on firefighters and their families. Through personal experience and lessons learned, this session will focus on recognizing warning signs, looking out for fellow responders, breaking the stigma surrounding mental health, and understanding that asking for help is a sign of strength—not weakness.

PM Session — Cody Spaulding | The Salty Paramedic

The afternoon portion will feature **Cody Spaulding, “The Salty Paramedic,”** bringing his unique, relatable, and straight-forward perspective to mental health in fire and EMS.

Cody will explore the realities of working in emergency services—from difficult calls and cumulative trauma to burnout, stress, and the ways first responders often use humor to cope with what they experience. His presentation combines real-world experience, humor, and serious conversation to address subjects that are often difficult to talk about within the firehouse.

Together, these two sessions provide a full-day look at the human side of emergency services—**the things we see, the things we carry, and the importance of taking care of the people who spend their careers taking care of everyone else.**

130 Hard to Get II**Saturday 8:30am – 5pm**

Course Codes: V0000 – Building Construction

U0000 – Fire Prevention/Public Education

I0000 – Ropes

135 EMT Con-Ed IV**Sunday 8:30am – 5pm**

Course Codes: Various

140 Basic Firefighting III**Sunday 8:30am – 5pm**

Course Codes: B0000 – Safety
K0000 – Hose, Nozzle, Apps
N0000 – Loss Control

This course will cover eight of the recommended twenty hours of training for new firefighters and enhance the knowledge of the veteran firefighter. It will consist of 2 hours of Safety, 3 hours of Fire Hose Nozzles & Appliances and 3 hours of Loss Control (Salvage & Overhaul).

Equipment needed: Full turnout gear, including SCBA

145 Fire Inspector I (KY Fire Marshall)**Sunday 8:30am – 5pm**

Course Code: DD0001

This class is designed for fire professionals that perform fire prevention inspections on a daily basis. This class will provide instruction on the 2012 fire codes. Prior knowledge of dealing with inspections is required. This class will consist of instruction followed by an exam. Students are encouraged to bring a tablet computer or laptop and calculator.

Lead Instructor: State Fire Marshall's Office

150 Drivers Training Simulator & Cone Course**Sunday 8:30am – 5pm**

Course Code: CC0000

This course will include classroom presentation, as well as hands-on practice with a Drivers Training Simulator and Cone Course. Topics such as safe operation of a fire apparatus, laws regulating operations, and frequent causes of accidents will be discussed. This course has been updated to include additional information and skills on inspection of apparatus.

155 LIVE FIRE – Helicopter/Car Fire**Sunday 8:30am – 5pm**

Course Codes: M0000
W0000

Fire Control & Hose Handling Techniques for Vehicle Fires with hands on prop, Helicopter/ARFF Fires with hands on prop. This is an all-day, hands-on course for the beginner and/or experienced firefighter who wishes to enhance their skills for routine, as well as some non-routine calls involving live fire. Will require Live Fire Competency Forms from the student's perspective agency.

PRE-REQUISITES/EQUIPMENT NEEDED Students should be prepared for training in full turnout gear and SCBA while on air.

160 Electric Vehicles (AM)/Solar Panels (PM)

Sunday 8:30am – 5pm

Course Code: B0000

This course will be 4 hours of training in Solar Panel Awareness & 4 hours of training in Hybrid Vehicle Technology. Solar Panels are becoming increasingly popular in residential and commercial occupancies. Firefighters must understand the multiple hazards that exist with solar panels and the various ways they are constructed and installed. Hybrid Vehicles travel roadways in every jurisdiction daily. These vehicles are often hard to identify and even harder to mitigate. This course will provide responders with the information needed to properly identify a hybrid vehicle by visual indicators, provide an understanding of hybrid vehicle systems and hazards, and describes proper response procedures that ensure the safety of emergency personnel.

Two Day Classes

200 Swift Water Operations

Sat/Sun 8:30am – 5pm

Course Code: Q0005

This course provides emergency responders with the knowledge and practical skills needed to safely operate during swift water and flood rescue incidents. Students will learn to recognize water-related hazards, evaluate rescue situations, select appropriate personal protective equipment, and work effectively as part of a swift water rescue team.

Training will emphasize both rescuer safety and effective rescue operations in moving-water environments. Topics include hydrology and water dynamics, hazard recognition, PPE, shore-based rescue techniques, throw bags, rope systems, victim contact and handling, swimming and maneuvering in moving water, and team-based rescue operations. Students should expect physically demanding, hands-on training in or around moving water. Appropriate swift water rescue PPE is required.

205 Arson I

Sat/Sun 8:30am – 5pm

Course Code: Y0001

This is the National Fire Academy course, “Fire Investigations for First Responders” (2022). The purpose of this 2-day course is to provide first responders with the tools to understand the key role they play in fire scene examination and in preserving and protecting important evidence for any subsequent investigation. The content of the course will provide a clear definition of the role of the first responder and identify the preservation and protection of evidence and proper reporting of the information to appropriate officials.

Three Day Classes

300 ICS 300

Friday/Saturday/Sunday

Course Code: FF0003

NIMS ICS-300: Intermediate Incident Command System for Expanding Incidents is designed for emergency response personnel who may assume a supervisory or leadership role during incidents that require an expanding Incident Command System (ICS) organization.

This course builds upon the foundational concepts presented in ICS-100, ICS-200, IS-700, and IS-800 and provides participants with a more in-depth understanding of incident management under the National Incident Management System (NIMS).

Students will participate in classroom discussion, practical exercises, and incident-based scenarios covering topics including command and general staff functions, unified command, incident objectives, organizational expansion, resource management, transfer of command, and the incident action planning process.

Emphasis is placed on developing an effective ICS organization capable of managing complex or rapidly expanding incidents involving multiple agencies, jurisdictions, and disciplines.

Recommended Audience: Fire officers, firefighters, EMS personnel, emergency management personnel, law enforcement, public safety communications personnel, and others who may serve in supervisory or command positions during emergency incidents.

Prerequisites: ICS-100, ICS-200, IS-700, and IS-800.

In consideration of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System ("KCTCS") Kentucky Fire Commission State Fire Rescue Training (referred to hereafter as "SFRT") allowing me to participate in this emergency service training class, I represent and agree as follows:

1. Assumption of Risk. I understand and acknowledge that the very nature of the training is dangerous and there are certain inherent risks associated with participating in the training, including but not limited to fire-related risks. I understand that the specific risks vary, but that they include injury, loss, or damage to myself or my property, or death, resulting from exposure to fire and unsafe conditions. I understand that efforts will be made by the instructional staff to create a working environment that is as safe as possible, and that the instructional staff will give me careful and prudent instruction in the operation of equipment and how to perform each task. However, I also understand that neither KCTCS nor SFRT – nor their respective boards, officers, agents, or employees – has control over these inherent risks, and that the risks cannot be eliminated completely regardless of the care taken by KCTCS or SFRT. By signing below, I represent that I appreciate the risks. I accept and voluntarily assume all risks that may arise from or in connection with my participation in the training. I understand that I am ultimately responsible for my own safety, and for my actions at all times.

2. Participation. I agree to perform only those activities specifically designated for the training, to follow all instructions and directions given to me by the instructional staff, and to adhere to all applicable safety standards. I will not participate in any activity that is not directly related to the training and class function, and I will ask for additional information before I proceed with a training procedure if I am unsure of the procedure or of the instructions and directions given.

3. Workers' Compensation. I understand that in order to participate in this training, I must be a member in good standing with a fire department or response agency, and I must be covered by the workers' compensation insurance of that department or agency. By signing this document, I certify that I meet these requirements. Live Fire Course Competency Validation/Fitness for Duty Form

Required for all students before participating in SFRT Live Fire Training

NFPA 1403 (2018 Edition) 4.3.1 - 4.3.3 require that all participants must have prior training and meet prerequisites in certain subjects before participating in live fire training. These minimum subjects include:

1) Safety; 2) Fire Behavior; 3) Portable Extinguishers; 4) Personal Protective Equipment & SCBA; 5) Ladders; 6) Fire Hose, Appliances, and Streams; 7) Overhaul; 8) Water Supply; 9) Ventilation; 10) Forcible Entry; 11) Building Construction. Specific prerequisite training must also be met in these areas: Fire Dynamics; Health and Safety; Fundamentals of Fire Behavior; Fire Development in Compartments; Nozzle Techniques and Door Control.

The Chief Officer of _____ Fire Department authorizes that _____ completed the minimum training/prerequisites and may participate in the live fire training evolutions present by SFRT.

NFPA 1403 (2018 Edition) 4.4.1 requires that all participants must be rehabbed in accordance with NFPA 1584, Chapter 6. Before being released from the rehab area to participate in a State Fire Rescue Training live fire training evolution, normal conditions are considered to consist of: heart rate of 60-100; respiratory rate of 12-20; systolic blood pressure less than 160; diastolic blood pressure of less than 100; pulse oximetry of 95% or greater. Participants are encouraged to periodically check their vital signs and seek appropriate medical attention for abnormal signs/symptoms.

Participants must be a member of a Fire Department, Industrial Fire Brigade or Junior Firefighter program (Ages 15-17) that is recognized by the Kentucky Fire Commission to participate in live fire training delivered by State Fire Rescue Training. ID's will be checked by SFRT instructors before allowing students to participate in live fire training and some evolutions/activities are restricted for 15-17 year old Junior Firefighters (See current Junior Firefighter Guidelines on KY Fire Commission website.) All turnout gear must be less than 10 years of age. Per NFPA 1403 (2018 Edition) A4.9.5 it is recommended that all participants wear full-length clothing made of natural fibers or fire-retardant materials under their personal protective equipment during live fire evolutions.

Facepiece seal protection: SFRT requires that all students must be compliant with OSHA 29 CFR 1910.134:

"1910.134(g)(1)(i) -The employer shall not permit respirators with tight-fitting facepieces to be worn by employees who have: **1910.134(g)(1)(i)(A)** - Facial hair that comes between the sealing surface of the facepiece and the face or that interferes with valve function;" (hair growth between the skin and the facepiece sealing surface, such as stubble beard growth, beard, mustache or sideburns which cross the respirator sealing surface).
