COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

(1) EMT REFRESHER

This is a three-day course taught on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday that will cover all training requirements as set forth by the Kentucky Board of Emergency Medical Services (KBEMS) and the National Registry of EMT's for the 24-hour EMT Refresher Class/NCCP and incorporate both lecture and practical experience, including competency testing. *Sponsored by Air EVAC*

(2) HAZMAT AWARENESS

This 4-hour training program addresses Awareness Level response for Hazardous Material from IFSTA. This class will teach the student to use various hazardous material handbooks to identify a hazardous incident. This class is a pre-requisite for attending the Hazmat Operations class on Friday and Saturday.

(3) HAZMAT OPERATIONS

This is a two-day hands-on class taught on Saturday and Sunday. You must have attended the Hazmat Awareness class taught on Friday evening (Oct. 21st) or other approved class to attend. This class addresses Operations Level response for Hazardous Material from IFSTA. This class will take the student from hazardous incident recognition through setting up a decontamination line. **Equipment needed:** Bunker gear, SCBA and spare cylinder.

(4) EXTRICATION

This class will begin with a short lecture to familiarize the student with extrication tools and principles. The class will practice cutting techniques on small to large vehicles and will have some technical scenarios to work through. This class will provide the students the opportunity to assess, plan, and implement extrication strategies in a variety of situations including passenger vehicles and larger commercial vehicles.

(5) WILDLAND AWARENESS

Kentucky Mandatory 3-hour Wildland Firefighting Awareness class developed for Kentucky Firefighters seeking certification by the Kentucky Fire Commission. Case histories will be presented in the program so we may learn how to keep from repeating the mistakes made in other tragic events.

(6) PTSD/SILENT MAYDAY

The fire service has long been about helping others; these days more than ever, that includes fellow firefighters. The Silent Mayday is a Strategy and Tactics Course for Fire Service Suicide Intervention and Prevention. This class will discuss suicide prevention, awareness training and intervention techniques for use among first responder personnel and their families. Students will come away with the ability to understand the stress, pressure, and culture in the fire service that can lead to suicidal ideation. Topics include how to develop strategies to train fire service personnel in suicide prevention, recognize the importance of establishing department policy and procedures related to suicide prevention and post-reaction, and how to convey the importance of all the above during future fire service suicide prevention training, identify behaviors and communications and understand, identify, and limit effects of Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder. (PTSD).

(7) FIRE BLAST PROP

This is a NFPA 1403 compliant LIVE-FIRE course which will utilize the Fire Blast burn trailer. **Equipment needed: Full turnout gear and SCBA with PASS device and spare cylinder. All turnout gear must be NFPA compliant with no component older than 10 years. Students will not be allowed to participate if the instructor(s) find that the gear is not NFPA compliant or otherwise poses a hazard. SCBA cylinders must have a current hydrostatic test date. Prerequisites: Completion of NFPA 1403 required components prior to enrolling; Live Fire Course Competency Validation/Fitness for duty form for live fire participation and Live Fire Training release form. These forms are available at www.sfrt9.com under the Downloadable documents link or contact our SFRT9 office for these forms. Any student with facial hair that impedes the seal of the face piece will not be allowed to participate in accordance with NFPA Standards.**

(8) BEVERLY HILLS SUPPER CLUB FIRE

This class is a look at the Beverly Hills Supper Club Fire through the eyes of John Beatsch, a Lieutenant on the first-in engine company. It will give a first-hand account of the fire, the rescue efforts, the aftermath of the fire and the changes that took place as a result of the fire. It is not an attempt to determine the cause of the fire or the reasons for the large loss of life although both will be examined and discussed. **This class is open to the Public.**

(9) FLASHOVER AWARENESS

This 3-hour class is designed to deliver the minimum requirement for the 150-hour certification. During this class, the student will learn the indicators, both internal and external, of an impending flashover or backdraft situation and tactics to reduce the risks. This class will be lecture only.

(10) FLASHOVER PROP

Welcome to the Kentucky Fire Commission Flashover Recognition & Survival Course. This course was created and adopted to provide structural firefighters in Kentucky, a safe and secure system of Flashover training. This course meets the 8-hour requirement for all firefighters seeking the 400-hour certification level in Kentucky. The goal is to improve recognition and provide survival techniques to save firefighters from injury and death from rapid fire progression and related phenomena. **PREREQUISITES: Completion of NFPA 1403 required training components prior to enrolling using Live Fire Course Competency Validation/Fitness for duty form for live fire participation and Live Fire Training release form. These forms are available on our website at www.sfrt9.com under the Downloadable documents link or you can contact our SFRT9 office for these forms. Any student with facial hair that impedes the seal of the face piece will not be allowed to participate in accordance with 29 CFR 1910.134 (OSHA). Protective gear will be inspected prior to entry into the trailer. All gear must be within the 10-year from manufacture date. Equipment needed: Full turnout gear and SCBA with PASS device and spare cylinder.**

(11) PUMP OPERATIONS

Pumper Operations and Theory will allow the firefighter to learn competency in the performance requirements necessary to perform the duties of a pumper operator. Basic preventive maintenance, pump operation, hydraulic calculations, relay pumping, and pump testing will be covered. Students will execute these skills through hands on training involving a front-line pumper. Equipment needed: Bunker gear suggested, PPE minimum-boots and gloves.

(12) WATER SUPPLY

This course is designed for fire department personnel who utilize mobile water supply operations. Students will familiarize themselves with various alternative water sources and the equipment that is necessary to make use of those sources. Students will also discuss the need to pre-plan mobile water supply operations. Upon successful completion of this class, the student will learn how to make more efficient use of their department's equipment. Equipment needed: Bunker gear suggested, PPE minimum - boots and gloves.

(13) BASIC FIREFIGHTING

This class is for the new firefighters or seasoned veterans wanting to “brush up” on their skills. Students will be given some basic firefighting knowledge and practicing skills necessary to begin a long and safe life of fire suppression. **NOTE: This class has an optional session from 1:00 PM Friday until 6:00 PM. Students attending ALL sessions will complete the 20 training hours recommended by the Kentucky Fire Commission before emergency response activity.** Equipment needed: Protective clothing will be required all three days and shall consist of NFPA APPROVED coat, pants, boots, hood, helmet, gloves, SCBA, and spare bottle.

(14) MACHINERY RESCUE

Have you ever received a call for a subject stuck in an HVAC vent, a wedding ring stuck on a finger, or even a motorcycle accident victim impaled on a signpost? The rescuer often finds difficulty in approaching these situations simply because of the unknowns. This class will bring a new perspective to this type of incident. Instructors will provide “out of the box” ways of thinking that are usually not incorporated with normal fire service operations. This different train of thought will help the student develop a framework of techniques and tools that will make this operation smooth and safe. At the end of this class the student will be confident in proper tool choice for these incidents and able to operate with confidence on scene. This class focuses upon hands-on training using many different types of cutting tools to complete extrication scenarios. **Equipment needed: Safety glasses, helmet, turnout coat and work gloves.**

(15) FF SURVIVAL & RESCUE

The Kentucky Fire Commission mandates that ALL firefighters need to attend the Firefighter Survival & Rescue course to attain certification as a firefighter in KY. The Firefighter Survival course is the first segment of this training course and is intended to illustrate to the student the procedures to implement and follow to save oneself in the event of a catastrophic event on the fireground. The Firefighter Rescue is the second segment of this course and is intended to train the firefighter how to work to rescue someone else in the event of a bad situation on the fireground. Firefighter Survival will be offered on Saturday and Firefighter Rescue will be offered on Sunday. ***This is a two-day class offered on Saturday and Sunday. Junior firefighters are welcome in this class but must provide completed Jr. FF Program Training and Emergency Contact Information form prior to participation in class. Jr. FF forms are available on our website at www.sfrt9.com under the Downloadable documents link or you can contact our SFRT9 office for these forms. Equipment needed: Full protective clothing & SCBA required.***

(16) HARD TO GET HOURS

Have you found yourself needing a few training hours that are next to impossible to find? Students will be able to choose one of two classes offered in the morning and afternoon each day. Three-hour classes will be offered, and students are required to attend the entire class. **Equipment needed: Full turnout gear, helmet and gloves are required.**

(17) HEAVY RESCUE (SCHOOL BUS)

This class is designed for the first responder that wants to take their rescue skills to the next level! This hybrid class of auto extrication and heavy vehicle rescue will provide the student with the knowledge and skills to mitigate vehicle stabilization and extrication encounters from simple to complex. This course will challenge you to work individually and in teams to respond to increasingly complex rescue scenarios. The auto extrication portion of the class will cover stabilization including basic wood cribbing, struts and other methods; the heavy rescue portion of the class will cover car/truck under ride, commercial trucks, busses, and heavy lifting. **Equipment needed: Full turnout gear or extrication coveralls, helmet, gloves, eye protection.**

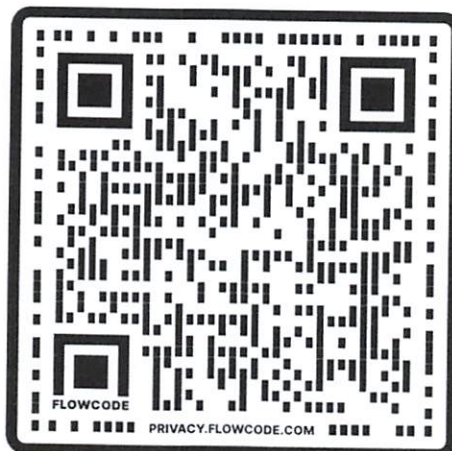

Live Fire Course Competency Validation/Fitness for Duty Form

Required for all students before participating in SFRT Live Fire Training

NFPA 1403 (2018 Edition) 4.3.1 - 4.3.3 require that all participants must have prior training and meet prerequisites in certain subjects before participating in live fire training. These minimum subjects include:

1) Safety; 2) Fire Behavior; 3) Portable Extinguishers; 4) Personal Protective Equipment & SCBA; 5) Ladders; 6) Fire Hose, Appliances, and Streams; 7) Overhaul; 8) Water Supply; 9) Ventilation; 10) Forcible Entry; 11) Building Construction. Specific prerequisite training must also be met in these areas: Fire Dynamics; Health and Safety; Fundamentals of Fire Behavior; Fire Development in Compartments; Nozzle Techniques and Door Control.

The Chief Officer of _____ Fire Department authorizes that _____ completed the minimum training/prerequisites and may participate in the live fire training evolutions present by SFRT.

NFPA 1403 (2018 Edition) 4.4.1 requires that all participants must be rehabbed in accordance with NFPA 1584, Chapter 6. Before being released from the rehab area to participate in a State Fire Rescue Training live fire training evolution, normal conditions are considered to consist of: heart rate of 60-100; respiratory rate of 12-20; systolic blood pressure less than 160; diastolic blood pressure of less than 100; pulse oximetry of 95% or greater. Participants are encouraged to periodically check their vital signs and seek appropriate medical attention for abnormal signs/symptoms.

Participants must be a member of a Fire Department, Industrial Fire Brigade or Junior Firefighter program (Ages 15-17) that is recognized by the Kentucky Fire Commission to participate in live fire training delivered by State Fire Rescue Training. ID's will be checked by SFRT instructors before allowing students to participate in live fire training and some evolutions/activities are restricted for 15-17 year old Junior Firefighters (See current Junior Firefighter Guidelines on KY Fire Commission website.) All turnout gear must be less than 10 years of age. Per NFPA 1403 (2018 Edition) A4.9.5 it is recommended that all participants wear full-length clothing made of natural fibers or fire-retardant materials under their personal protective equipment during live fire evolutions.

Facepiece seal protection: SFRT requires that all students must be compliant with OSHA 29 CFR 1910.134:

1910.134(g)(1)(i) -The employer shall not permit respirators with tight-fitting facepieces to be worn by employees who have: **1910.134(g)(1)(i)(A)** - Facial hair that comes between the sealing surface of the facepiece and the face or that interferes with valve function;" (hair growth between the skin and the facepiece sealing surface, such as stubble beard growth, beard, mustache or sideburns which cross the respirator sealing surface).

In consideration of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System ("KCTCS") Kentucky Fire Commission State Fire Rescue Training (referred to hereafter as "SFRT") allowing me to participate in this emergency service training class, I represent and agree as follows:

1. **Assumption of Risk.** I understand and acknowledge that the very nature of the training is dangerous and there are certain inherent risks associated with participating in the training, including but not limited to fire-related risks. I understand that the specific risks vary, but that they include injury, loss, or damage to myself or my property, or death, resulting from exposure to fire and unsafe conditions. I understand that efforts will be made by the instructional staff to create a working environment that is as safe as possible, and that the instructional staff will give me careful and prudent instruction in the operation of equipment and how to perform each task. However, I also understand that neither KCTCS nor SFRT – nor their respective boards, officers, agents, or employees – has control over these inherent risks, and that the risks cannot be eliminated completely regardless of the care taken by KCTCS or SFRT. By signing below, I represent that I appreciate the risks. I accept and voluntarily assume all risks that may arise from or in connection with my participation in the training. I understand that I am ultimately responsible for my own safety, and for my actions at all times.

2. **Participation.** I agree to perform only those activities specifically designated for the training, to follow all instructions and directions given to me by the instructional staff, and to adhere to all applicable safety standards. I will not participate in any activity that is not directly related to the training and class function, and I will ask for additional information before I proceed with a training procedure if I am unsure of the procedure or of the instructions and directions given.

3. **Workers' Compensation.** I understand that in order to participate in this training, I must be a member in good standing with a fire department or response agency, and I must be covered by the workers' compensation insurance of that department or agency. By signing this document, I certify that I meet these requirements. I understand that in the event of any accident or injury, any workers' compensation claim must be made under the coverage of my department or agency. In no event will I request workers' compensation coverage from KCTCS or SFRT and either KCTCS or SFRT will be responsible for any accident or injury.

4. **Release and Hold Harmless.** I understand that participating in the training may result in injury, loss, or damage to myself or my property, or death, and neither KCTCS or SFRT – nor their respective boards, officers, agents, or employees – will be responsible or liable for such injury, loss, damage, or death. By signing below, I release, hold harmless, and forever discharge KCTCS or SFRT – and their respective boards, officers, agents, and employees – from any and all claims, causes of action, or demands of every kind by reason of any injury to person or property, or death, arising from or in connection with my participation in this training.

5. **Alcohol and Medications.** I agree and represent that I will not consume alcoholic beverages or any prescription or non-prescription medications or other controlled substances that may impair my judgment or reaction time within the five (5) hours prior to any class, or during class.

6. **Live Fire.** I understand that this training involves live fire, I must have completed certain FF1 and FF2 job performing requirements, as set forth in NFPA 1001 and 1403 directives.
