One Day Classes

010 Flashover Recognition & Survival

FC40000 (with prop & live fire)

This 8 hour course is designed to train firefighters to recognize the signs, and to escape an impending Flashover. A flashover situation is a very serious life threatening event that could result in injury and/or loss of life to firefighters who encounter this dynamic fire situation. Students will be taught how to read smoke, utilize thermal imaging devices, as well as basic instincts to detect and escape a Flashover. This course is a mixture of classroom/lecture, as well as hands-on training utilizing a live-fire Flashover Recognition training prop.

Prerequisite: Completion of NFPA 1403 required components prior to enrolling; Live Fire Course Competency Form is required.

115 Hard to Get I

120 Bobtail 100 LPG LIVE FIRE

M0004

This is a LIVE-FIRE, HANDS-ON course that helps the firefighter make informed decisions concerning propane emergencies. The Bobtail Propane Prop & the Residential Prop will be utilized.

Equipment Needed: Full turnout gear and SCBA and spare cylinder. All turnout gear must be NFPA compliant with no component older than 10 years. Students will not be allowed to participate if the instructor(s) find that the gear is not NFPA compliant or otherwise poses a hazard.

Prerequisite: Completion of NFPA 1403 required components prior to enrolling; Live Fire Course Competency Form is required. OSHA 1910.134 (No Facial Hair impeding the seal of the facepiece)

125 Fire Alarms & Sprinklers

S0000

This class is developed and presented for the industry professionals that are required to attend and receive recertification credit for licensure. It will help students have a deeper understanding of fire alarm systems. Class will have discussions as to where alarms are required, installed and maintained. Also, proper inspection of the systems, how they function, how they help save lives, and how they may benefit the fire service. This class qualifies for the six (6) hours continuing education required for State Certified Fire Alarm Inspectors.

This class is the second step in the Fire Marshal's revised Inspector Certification program. This class is designed for fire professionals that perform fire prevention inspections on a daily basis. This class will provide instruction on the 2012 fire codes. Prior knowledge of dealing with inspections is required. This class will consist of instruction followed by an exam. Students are encouraged to bring a tablet computer or laptop and calculator.

130 Fire Inspector I

This course will concentrate on safely removing a trapped or unconscious firefighter from a burning structure. Students will review OSHA requirements for "2 in – 2 out" and discuss how to set up a rapid intervention team. This course and course 105 FF Survival meet the requirements for FRS 2052 in the KCTCS Fire/Rescue Science Technology AAS Degree Program.

155 Vehicle & Helicopter Fires LIVE FIRE

Fire Control & Hose Handling Techniques for Vehicle Fires with hands on prop, Helicopter/ARFF Fires with hands on prop. This is an all-day, hands-on course for the beginner and/or experienced firefighter who wishes to enhance their skills for routine, as well as some non-routine calls involving live fire. Will require Live Fire Competency Forms from the student's perspective agency.

Equipment Needed: Full turnout gear and SCBA and spare cylinder. All turnout gear must be NFPA compliant with no component older than 10 years. Students will not be allowed to participate if the instructor(s) find that the gear is not NFPA compliant or otherwise poses a hazard.

Prerequisite: Completion of NFPA 1403 required components prior to enrolling; Live Fire Course Competency Form is required. OSHA 1910.134 (No Facial Hair impeding the seal of the facepiece) will be enforced by SFRT Instructors for anyone participating in the live burn.

160 Beverly Hills Supper Club

This seminar is a review of the Beverly Hills Supper Club fire in Southgate KY. John Beatsch was a newly appointed lieutenant on the Southgate Volunteer Fire Department and responded on the first fire truck on the scene. 165 people died at Beverly Hills making it the third deadliest night club fire in the United States. The seminar will examine the reasons for the large loss of life as well as other deadly fires and their historical significance and similarities

This class is the third step in the Fire Marshal's revised Inspector Certification program. This class is designed for the fire inspectors and building code officials that deal with life safety issues on a daily basis. The student will get detailed instruction on occupancy requirements and occupant loads. This class will consist of instruction followed by an exam. Students are encouraged to bring a tablet computer or laptop and calculator.

This is a 2-day, 16 hr HANDS ON course that will present various rescue scenarios for rescuers to use during machinery incidents. This is designed to educate the rescuer on the proper techniques of extrication from machinery. Topics covered will include safety, scene size-up & preparation, stabilization, machinery designs & features, as well as various types of patient extrication techniques. This will be a strictly hands-on course where students will learn and practice the most up-to-date techniques for patient disentanglement, incident management & scene safety.

210 First 5 Minutes

Hands on breakout skills sessions will be conducted to enhance students; knowledge on how to command and control incidents and events, both large and small. This class is perfect for the newly promoted officer, seasoned officer, chiefs, or even veteran firefighters. Anyone who attends this course will leave with a better understanding of how to maintain situational awareness while always thinking ahead.

Five Day Class

300 Driver/Operator Pumper and Mobile Water Supply

This is a 5-day class that will start Friday October 7, 2022 and end Tuesday October 11, 2022. The IFSAC written test & skills will be given on Wednesday October 12, 2022.

The goal of this course is to meet the minimum requirements set forth in NFPA 1002 chapter 5 and 10. This class will define important terms used in pump operations and identify components of a fire pump and the associated equipment. The class will also show how to efficiently operate a fire pump, troubleshoot problems that may occur during pump operations, as well as perform routine tests, inspections and service functions of an apparatus equipped with a fire pump.
